

Teddy works in his office.

Teddy (hears a knock on the door): Come in!

Piney Porcupine: Hello, Teddy! Do you have time to talk to me? I have a problem.

Teddy: I always have time to help you with a problem, Piney.

Piney: Some kids are scared of me. They run away from me and say mean things.

Teddy: Why do you think they are scared of you?

Piney: Look at my new coat. It is very prickly. My spines are sharp. Kids think I will hurt them.

Teddy: How can we show everyone that sharp does not equal hurt?

Piney: When you try to hurt someone with your sharp spines, that's mean. But I don't do that.

Teddy (writes on the white board): Sharp spines do not equal hurt. Sharp spines plus push equal hurt. Sharp spines plus help equal help.

Piney: Yes, I may look sharp, but I won't hurt you. I am not very big, so my sharp spines protect me.

Teddy: How can kids see the real you, not just the sharp spines outside? How can they see the helpful inside?

Piney: I'm really good at math. I will help anyone with math. If a kid doesn't understand fractions, I can help. One-half of my back is soft fur, one-half is sharp spines." (writes on the white board): $\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{2} = 1$.

Teddy: That's a good real-life problem, Piney. You can be a good math helper.

Piney (*writes on white board*) Look! Sharp has other meanings. Sharp = pointed. Sharp = smart.

Teddy: You are right!

Piney: I will make a sign to stick on my spines - SHARP MATH HELPER."

Teddy: That's a great idea, Piney! Kids will see you as a helper and won't be scared of you anymore.

Piney: I really appreciate your help, Teddy!
